

How to Build a Custom Home in Alexandria Without Buying a New Lot

First Things First: Let's Assess Your Existing Property

Your property and local zoning may impact what you can and cannot do with your home. As your builder, we want your journey to be as stress-free as possible. Therefore, we recommend doing a little due diligence before committing to a building project.

Here are a few points you'll want to clarify as they will provide a framework for your new home's design:

Zoning and lot restrictions

Check the City of Alexandria's [zoning rules](#), setbacks, and height limits. This data will let you know distance limits from the structure to the property line, how high you can build your new home or add-on, and generally what type of construction is permitted on your lot. You will not be able to obtain a building permit if your plans do not comply with zoning bylaws.

You can easily check your address's zoning using the City's [GIS Parcel Viewer tool](#). Simply enter your address, and the system will provide zoning codes for the area, any linked plats (historical property divisions), and various other details.

Structural feasibility

When is a teardown better than a remodel? If your home has “good bones,” a solid foundation, and a layout similar to what your new home plans are, a remodel might be a better choice. Ultimately, this option will be more affordable, less disruptive, and time-consuming.

A site analysis is often recommended to assess the home's structure and ensure it meets current building codes. During this process, you will review existing plans, inspect the foundation, conduct a soil analysis, and verify that the existing foundation can support the new design.

You will also create a new layout by marking the building's perimeters and setbacks to confirm all measurements.

Neighborhood considerations

When planning your new home's design, consider the surrounding neighborhood and the types of houses that are nearby. You'll want to ensure your new build is scaled appropriately in relation to others and, ideally, use materials that complement the surroundings. That is not to say you need to make it look like the rest. For example, if you're in a historic district, consider a transitional aesthetic that blends modern design with the [historic charm of Alexandria](#).

Remodel vs. Rebuild: What's the Right Path for You?

The decision to remodel vs. rebuild is a very personal one; we can't tell you what's right for you from an emotional standpoint, but there are practical aspects to consider. [Cost is a significant factor](#), as is the time required to complete the work. Lastly, can you achieve the customizations you want without building a new house from scratch?

Make your wish list. Work with your builder to assign costs to each element. Consider the timelines associated with each option, where you will live while the work is being done, and how those costs will affect your overall budget.

From a financial standpoint, you'll want to explore financing options early on. There are several options to choose from based on what you plan to do, but the cost of financing might impact your decision.

Construction loans, for example, can be more costly in the long run. Lenders consider construction loans to be riskier than renovation loans. If you opt for a rebuild, you might

even consider refinancing your mortgage. It's essential to explore all options so you understand the implications of your choices.

And no matter what you choose to do in the end, it is critical to obtain a builder's assessment early in the process. The information you glean here may well inform your next steps.
